Wisconsin Early Care and Education Federal Relief Funds



Since March 2020, the Department of Children and Families developed the following funding opportunities and supports for early care and education programs and educators through federal relief provided by the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act and the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSA).

Child Care Counts

\$237 million

COVID-19 Emergency Payment Program

- Funded through the CARES Act
- Delivered \$50,949,747 to 2,712 child care providers
- Helped keep over 20,000 child care workers employed and receiving pay during Spring and Summer 2020
- Enabled child care to continue for almost 80,000 Wisconsin children

COVID-19 Supplementary Payment Program

- Funded through the CARES Act
- Delivered \$79,747,570 to 2,879 child care providers
- Helped keep over 19,000 child care workers remain employed or become employed during Fall 2020
- Enabled child care to continue for almost 70,000 children under age 6

COVID-19 Response & Relief Program

- Funded through CRRSA
- Delivered \$106,505,165 to over 3,260 child care providers
- Helped keep over 27,711 child care workers remain employed or become employed during Spring 2021
- Enabled child care to continue for over 98,000 children

Workforce Retention and Recognition Program

\$10 million

- Funded through CRRSA
- Provided stipends of \$300-\$550 to over 14,000 eligible early childhood educators
- DCF contracted with the <u>Wisconsin Early Childhood Association (WECA)</u> to disseminate these stipends using their existing <u>REWARD Stipend Program</u> system



Provider Training

\$5 million

- Funded through CRRSA
- Currently, the entry level trainings that are required for early care and education (ECE) workforce are
 outdated in content and often inaccessible to educators who have a disability, live in rural or tribal
 communities without access to broadband, do not have appropriate technology, speak a language other
 than English, or do not live near a higher education institution
- Funding will be used to modernize the curriculum to include current best practices, make required courses available online and in-person, and translate trainings into multiple languages and for varying abilities




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Technology Access Program

\$10 million

- Funded through CRRSA
- Provided 3,846 child care providers with technology devices and software including laptops, tablets, printers/scanners, wireless routers, Wi-Fi access points, Wi-Fi boosters, walkie talkies, and QuickBooks accounting software to support business operations
- DCF contracted with <u>Supporting Families</u>
 <u>Together Association (SFTA)</u> and <u>Kaplan Early</u>
 <u>Learning Company</u> to offer eligible child care
 programs the opportunity to order free
 technology devices and soft ware to support
 business operations



Shared Services Networks

\$5.5 million

- Funded through CRRSA
- With child care businesses operating on thin margins and COVID-19 highlighting the need for sustainable business models, shared services networks aim to maximize resource efficiencies
- DCF established a contract with the <u>Wisconsin</u> <u>Early Childhood Association (WECA)</u> to expand the <u>Wisconsin Early Education Shared Services</u> <u>Network (WEESSN)</u>
- WEESSN brings together family and center-based ECE programs to pool resources and leverage economies of scale:
 - Automates back-office tasks
 - o Provides tailored business coaching
 - o Facilitates bulk purchasing
 - Utilizes shared substitute teacher pool

Business-Supported Child Care

\$10 million



- Funded through CRRSA
- In an effort to help businesses that are struggling to recruit and retain staff because of a lack of child care, Partner Up! Grants will incentivize workforce development through partnerships between Wisconsin businesses and child care providers
- Businesses in essential sectors will enter agreements with child care providers to secure subsidized slots for their employees
- Child care providers receive full tuition at true cost-of-care, providing consistent revenue at a pre-determined amount, resulting in stable budget and stronger business practices
