Why were the changes necessary?

Racial disparities occur at nearly every major decision-making point along the child welfare continuum.

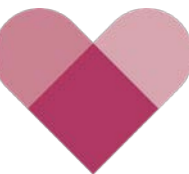


Why were the changes necessary?

Stakeholders identified the need for revisions to Wisconsin's current danger threat language and safety assessment process.

Project Scope

Enhance the current safety model (existing SAFE framework), to better facilitate a process to create comprehensive safety plans **with and informed by** families that better identify and document danger threats **AND** protective capacities.

What?

Identified problematic, biased language
and where changes could be made



What?

Did not change intent of threat



What?

Removed language in the danger threats that contain buzzwords and subjective wording.



What?

Ground the danger threat in the parent's/caregiver's behavior and the effect on the child.

Refinements and improvements to the safety planning process...



Why are additional changes necessary?

...Facilitates upfront safety decisions informed by families



Why are additional changes necessary?

...Direct connection to the case process



Why are additional changes necessary?

...Keep more children and youth safely in their homes

What are We Trying to Fix?

Fixing language so that it is equitable, just and wards against bias





Desired Outcome

Development of a process and criteria by which to identify children who are unsafe and require CPS intervention that focuses on maintaining children safely in their home, accomplished by engaging parents/caregivers in the assessment, decision making and planning process.
