Data and Research Workgroup Charge

Mechanisms will be identified to:

- collect and link data regarding sex trafficking victims across systems;
- modify existing information systems; and/or
- develop new systems and procedures.

Accurate and comprehensive data will:

- help inform the development of policies and programs; and
- measure the effectiveness of particular services and programs.

Department of Children & Families

- Data available in the statewide child welfare info system eWiSACWIS:
 - **o** Sex trafficking descriptor of alleged abuse
 - *Strengths*: Documents all allegations; personally identifiable information (PII) available.
 - *Limitations*: Training to counties to use descriptor will begin in 2017; Currently not required.

Child and Adolescent Needs & Strengths (CANS)

- *Strengths*: PII available, and detailed sex trafficking information collected; Required.
- *Limitations*: Only children in out-of-home care (OHC).

Department of Children & Families

- Plans to improve data:
 - o **2015 Wisconsin Act 367**: Requirement to have CPS investigate instances of non-caregiver sex trafficking.
 - Effective Date: May 29, 2017
 - 2015 Wisconsin Act 368: Requirement to inform the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC) about children missing from out-of-home care (OHC).
 - Effective Date: June 2016
 - Must inform law enforcement within 8 hours
 - Must inform NCMEC within 24 hours.

 eWiSACWIS holds additional details on children who return to OHC from a missing episode.

Department of Justice: Division of Law Enforcement Services

• Available Data: Uniform Crime Reporting Program

O Incident-Based Reporting

- Strengths: Documents all incidents of human trafficking known to law enforcement; demographic information (age, gender, race) available for both victims and offenders.
- *Limitations*: Currently only 100 law enforcement agencies are reporting incidentbased reporting data; human trafficking recently added to program and not all agencies have implemented; no PII.

Summary Based Reporting

- Human trafficking not currently collected in this program;
- More than 300 agencies reporting crime through summary-based reporting; and
- DOJ working to add human trafficking functionality in 2017.

Department of Justice: Division of Law Enforcement Services

• Plans to improve data:

- Law enforcement agency training;
- Development of additional reporting tools to highlight, among other things, the number of human trafficking offenses being reported;
- Vendor training of new data requirements (including human trafficking);
- Inclusion of human trafficking in summary-based reporting;
- Ongoing transition of law enforcement agencies to incident-based reporting; and
 - Following FBI plans to phase-out summary-based reporting in 2021.

Department of Justice: WI Clearinghouse for Missing and Exploited Children

• Available Data:

o National Crime Information Center (NCIC)

- Strengths: Requirement to report missing persons here. Name, DOB, and NCIC number are identified.
- Limitations: Does not directly identify human trafficking victims; time-intensive data cleanup ensures a more accurate analysis.

o National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC)

- Strengths: Referrals indicate those who may be trafficking victims.
- *Limitations*: Only DCF children missing from out-of-home care are reported to NCMEC (not all missing children).
- Plans to improve data

Department of Corrections

- Available data
 - Data on convictions
 - Strengths: Personally identifying information
 - *Limitations*: Data on charges unavailable.
- Current prevention work
- Possible prevention work

Court System – Consolidated Court Automation Programs (CCAP)

• Statutes:

Chapter 948 - Crimes Against Childrens. 948.051(1-3) & s. 948.08 Wis. Stats.Chapter 940 - Crimes Against Life and Bodily Securitys. 940.302 Wis. Stats.Chapter 973 - Sentencings. 973.015(2m)(b-c) Wis. Stats.

• *Strengths*: PII sometimes available.

• *Limitations*: Challenging to link data with other agencies; Difficult to quantify unique persons or incidents across statutes.

Identifying At-Risk Children

Dallas Police Department Model High-Risk Factors:

- children missing at age 12 or younger;
- children missing four or more times within a one year period; or
- children who have been missing for 30 days or longer.

Wisconsin Clearinghouse for Missing and Exploited Children

- Sex trafficking victims often have at least one of these high-risk indicators;
- Identifies high-risk children through NCIC data, provides to DCI agents who use it when they are otherwise contacting a juvenile to interview on a child sex trafficking case.

Department of Children and Families

- Identify youth who are at-risk or have been victims of sex trafficking to case plan around services needed for that particular youth and/or family.
- As of June 2016, requires assessment to ask a child or youth's experiences while they were missing from out-of-home care, including sex trafficking victimization.

 - Linking DCF and DOJ Clearinghouse data
 - *Benefits*: Determine a more comprehensive list of high-risk children.
 - *Limitations*: Data improvement necessary.
 - Linking DOC and Courts data.
 - *Benefits*: Determine a more comprehensive list of individuals to investigate.
 - *Limitations*: Data improvement necessary.
