45 CFR 98.41 (a) (1) (i) to (xi) requires that each state or tribal lead agency have health and safety requirements applicable to child care providers that include the following:

- Building and physical premises safety, including identification of and protection from hazards, bodies of water, and vehicular traffic.
- Prevention of shaken baby syndrome, abusive head trauma, and child maltreatment
- Emergency preparedness and response planning that includes procedures for evacuation, relocation, shelter-in-place and lock down, staff and volunteer emergency preparedness training and practice drills, communication and reunification with families, continuity of operations, and accommodation of infants and toddlers, children with disabilities, and children with chronic medical conditions.
- Pediatric first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

#### 45 CFR 98.44, Training and Professional Development

45 CFR 98.44 (b) (1) requires a pre-service training or an orientation training that is completed within 3 months for child care providers, teachers, and directors and that covers the following:

- The health and safety standards in 45 CFR 98.41 (a) (1) (i) to (xi), specifying the critical health and safety training that must be completed before caring for children unsupervised.
- Child development, including the major domains (cognitive, social, emotional, physical development and approaches to learning).

45 CFR 98.44 (b) (2) requires an annual minimum number of hours of ongoing professional development for child care providers, teachers, and directors that maintains and updates the health and safety training in 45 CFR 98.41 (a) (1) (i) to (xi).

#### 16. Compare With Approaches Being Used by Neighboring States (Illinois, Iowa, Michigan and Minnesota)

As a condition of receiving funding from the federal Child Care Development Fund, all states must ensure that the provisions in 45 CFR 98.40 to 98.49 are applicable to child care services provided within the state.
