Governor's Council on Domestic Abuse, Committee and Workgroups Open Meetings Law - Reminders

Note: This document should not be construed as legal advice.

When organizing a meeting:

- Prepare Public Notice
 - Include the time, date, place, and subject matter of the meeting
 - For a fully virtual meeting, include contact information for follow-up if a member of the public does not have the ability to join virtually.
 - o Must be published at least 24 hours in advance
 - If there is good cause and notice is impossible or impracticable, notice cannot be less than 2 hours
 - o Follow specific requirements for where publication must occur
 - For Council, Committees, and Workgroups, provide to DCF staff (Stacey Cicero) at least 10 days in advance, if possible.
- Ensure Accessibility
 - Reasonably accessible place for the public and open to all
 - o If virtual, make sure the virtual platform link works and is accessible to the public
- Keep a Record of the Meeting
 - o Create and preserve a record of all motions and roll-call votes
 - o Best practice to record this at the meeting or very soon after
 - Minutes are the most common way to do this
 - Meeting records are public records under Public Records law
- Use Closed Sessions Only When Authorized
 - o Must be noticed with the subject matter if contemplated at the time of the notice
 - A motion must be passed during an open session to start a closed session.
 - Must announce the nature of the business to be discussed and the specific statutory exemption that authorizes the closed session
 - Votes should usually not happen in closed sessions

For members:

- Avoid discussing matters within the body's authority outside of noticed meetings if you are with more than half of the body.
- Avoid walking quorums (a series of meetings between small groups of members in which the members agree to act uniformly)
- Don't reply all to emails or forward emails to the whole group (such e-mails can be considered a meeting)
