Dear Senate Chief Clerk Anderson and Assembly Chief Clerk Blazel:

In compliance with 2009 Wisconsin Act 78, the Child Welfare Public Disclosure Act, please accept the Department of Children and Families' (DCF's) 2025 annual report on alleged sexual abuse of children residing in out-of-home care. The data presented below addresses incidents of alleged sexual abuse for the period January 1 through December 31, 2025, and fulfills the DCF reporting requirements under Section 48.981(9)(b) of the Wisconsin Statutes. The data has been updated to reflect new information learned during the preparation of the 2025 annual report relating to incidents that were pending at the time of the release of the quarterly reports for the 2025 calendar year. For example, updating the number of incidents initially reported.

We appreciate the Legislature's interest in Wisconsin's child welfare system and their commitment to supporting DCF, county and tribal child welfare agencies, and the hundreds of non-profit organizations who work to protect Wisconsin children every day. Like you, we are saddened by all cases of child maltreatment and are committed to strengthening families so that child maltreatment does not occur. Wisconsin is fortunate to have dedicated and passionate child welfare professionals, and we want to recognize and express our appreciation for their commitment and compassion as they engage in these very challenging situations with children and families on a daily basis.

We encourage legislators and stakeholders to reinforce awareness that prevention of child maltreatment is a community-wide responsibility involving all individuals and organizations in the community, and to continue to support efforts at the local and state levels to develop a more robust and consistent array of child maltreatment prevention services. Through collaborative and data-driven analyses and discussions, we all can support efforts to strengthen the families in our state to provide safe, stable and nurturing homes for their children and help our families and children succeed and thrive.

The following is a summary of the findings in the [report](#):

*Number of Reported Incidents: 111*

Wisconsin child protective services agencies screened in and investigated 111 reported incidents of suspected sexual abuse to 88 children residing in out-of-home care.

*Dates of the Incidents:*

The 111 reported incidents are estimated to have occurred between October 2016 and December 2025. Because children disclose abuse in different stages, it is common for children to report incidents months or even years after the incident occurred. Furthermore, in cases of alleged abuse involving non-verbal children, dates of alleged maltreatment are often difficult or impossible to determine.

*Maltreatment Determinations:*

Of the 111 reported incidents, maltreatment determinations were made for 102 (92%) of the reported incidents, while 9 (8%) maltreatment determinations are pending because the investigations are not complete.

Of the 102 reported incidents where the maltreatment determination was made, 68 (67%) were unsubstantiated (i.e., preponderance of the evidence indicating that sexual abuse occurred was not found), 21 (21%) were substantiated, eight (8%) were deemed services not needed, three (3%) were unable to locate source, and two (2%) were deemed services needed.

*Nature of Maltreater Relationship:*

Of the 21 substantiated incidents, the relationships of the maltreaters to the children were as follows:

- A non-caregiver in seven incidents
- A minor maltreater in the placement setting in four incidents
- A biological parent in two incidents
- A stranger in two incidents
- A relative care provider in two incidents
- An unknown maltreater in one incident
- A minor maltreater not in the placement setting in one incident
- A temporary caregiver in one incident
- A relative non-care provider in one incident

Seven (33%) of the 21 substantiated incidents included allegations of sex trafficking.

*Types of Placement Settings:*

Of the 21 substantiated incidents, the placement types of the children were as follows:

- Missing from out-of-home care in five incidents
- A non-relative foster home in four incidents
- A non-relative treatment foster home in three incidents
- A group home in three incidents
- A shelter care facility in two incidents
- An unlicensed relative in two incidents
- A court-ordered kinship home in one incident
- An unlicensed non-relative in one incident

*Location of Substantiated Incidents:*

Of the 21 substantiated incidents of sexual abuse to children residing in out-of-home care, incidents took place in the following 12 counties:

- Nine incidents took place in Milwaukee County
- Two incidents took place in Grant County
- One incident took place in Cicero County, IL (This child was under jurisdiction in Wisconsin. The incident occurred outside of the state.)
- One incident took place in Dane County
- One incident took place in Green County
- One incident took place in Kenosha County
- One incident took place in Marathon County
- One incident took place in Racine County
- One incident took place in Rock County
- One incident took place in St. Croix County
- One incident took place in Winnebago County
- One incident took place in Wood County

*Ages or Age Group of Children:*

Alleged sexual abuse was reported and investigated for children 1 to 17 years of age. Of the 21 substantiated incidents of sexual abuse, there were six substantiated incidents for children seven years and younger and 15 substantiated incidents for children eight years and older.
