

**An Introduction to Wisconsin’s Title IV-E Program:
A System Overview**

What is Title IV-E?

Title IV-E represents the most significant source of federal funding allocated to support state and local child welfare programs and the children and families served by these local programs. In the past year, the Department of Children and Families (DCF) claimed over \$110 million from the federal Title IV-E program to fund child welfare services in Wisconsin. The revenue claimed in the following categories was used to support the following child welfare-related operations and services:

How do we get Title IV-E funds?

Title IV-E funding claims are generated for qualifying placement and administrative costs associated with children in out of home care or who are at imminent risk of being placed in out of home care. Funding is based on the federal financial participation rate (FFP), the proportion of children in out of home care who meet the federal Title IV-E eligibility requirements (also know as the penetration

rate) and the proportion of administrative activities performed on IV-E reimbursable activities as determined through a random moment time study.

Title IV-E Eligibility Determination and Re-determination Program Operations

Eligibility determinations are made when a child is removed from his or her home and on a semi-annual basis as long as the child remains in out of home care. Eligibility determination and re-determination recommendations are conducted by contracted staff, while approval and oversight are carried out by DCF staff.

Title IV-E Claiming Responsibilities

Federal Title IV-E claims are submitted to the federal Administration of Children and Families (ACF) by the DCF Bureau of Fiscal Services (BFS) and are governed by the Department’s federally approved cost allocation plan (PACAP). The PACAP establishes requirements associated with the following Title IV-E claiming components for IV-E Administrative claiming:

- DCF CORE cost reporting (administrative costs), or Cost Pool;
- Percentage of administrative time based on the DCF Human Services Random Moment Time Study (RMTS) identified as Title IV-E claiming;
- Title IV-E eligibility rate, or Penetration Rate, based on the child’s eligibility and provider reimbursability status;
- Federal matching or Federal Financial Participation (FFP), rate:

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* Training FFP is 75%; eWiSACWIS costs are applied to IV-E, TANF and state revenues and are reimbursed at 50% FFP with no RMTS or Penetration rate applied.

Fluctuations in the cost pool, RMTS results or the penetration rate affect the net rate of federal IV-E reimbursement for administrative costs.

What other requirements are associated with the Title IV-E Program?

Several state and federal requirements are in place to ensure the integrity and accuracy of the Department’s claims to the federal Title IV-E Program as follows:
