Youth Innovation Grants

Conference Call Summary – July 25, 2017

On July 25, 2017, the Bureau of Youth Services held an open conference call to answer questions about the <u>Youth Justice Innovation Grants</u> that are open to current Early Intervention recipients. Applications are due August 30, 2017.

Below is a summary of what was discussed on the call:

- The proposed project should be above and beyond what you currently do, and what you currently use Youth Aids or Early Intervention funding for but it is acceptable to build on current work. It does not have to be an entirely new project.
- Electronic monitoring is not to be a part of the alternatives to detention project because there is a lack of research showing this is an innovative practice. These projects are to be innovative and in line with as much research as possible.
- Counties need to submit proposals that use the full \$100,000 or \$250,000. As indicated in the application packet, there is a possibility of a no-cost extension if all funds are not used by the end of 2018.
- It is fine if other counties or tribes will benefit as a result of the project you propose. You can also consider whether it is helpful to apply with a partner. The guidelines for partnering are explained in the application packet.
- It is fine to use some of the funds for physical space as long as that directly serves the proposed project.
- It is also fine to use some of the funds for staff time as long as that directly serves the proposed project.
- It is not advisable to propose implementation of an assessment tool as a project because the state is already in the process of figuring out how to address this issue. Contact mailto:DCFYJ@wisconsin.gov?subject=Youth Innovation Grants with any questions about the ongoing assessment workgroup.
- If you already have a detailed budget, it is fine to submit that, but it is not required.
