December 2022

ECAC Budget Recommendations Finalized

Child Care Bills

- Legislators have proposed a package of child care-related bills that would:
 - Create a new regulation category of Large Family Child Care
 - Lower the minimum age for assistant child care teachers or school-age group leaders to 16, and remove restrictions on when/under what conditions an assistant child care teacher or school-age group lead can provide sole supervision to children





Child Care Bills

- Loosen child to staff ratios and increase the maximum number of children per age in group centers
- Increase the number of children certified family child care programs can serve
- Create a revolving loan fund for child care facility renovations (WEDC)
- Create a tax-advantaged child care reimbursement account (DFI)





Legislative Activity: DCF Feedback

- DCF was invited to testify for information
 - DCF iterated its statutory and regulatory role of ensuring the health and safety of children.
 - Higher ratios and lowered age requirements would put Wisconsin out of alignment with national recommendations and accrediting agencies.
- Further, these bills do not address affordability or workforce compensation
 - The bills do not address the lack of funding for Child Care Counts and the need for continued investment in the child care workforce.





Special Session on Workforce Challenges

- The Governor called the legislature into a special session to address workforce challenges, including:
 - \$365 million investment in child care, including over \$340 million for Child Care Counts and \$22 million for Partner Up!
 - Creating a paid family and medical leave program
 - Investment in higher education
 - Investment to strengthen key workforce sectors, including nursing and teaching
- Last week, the legislature adjourned the special session without taking action on the Governor's proposal and said they would be making their own workforce proposal



Child Care Counts

- To understand the impact of reductions in Child Care Counts funding and the anticipated impact of Child Care Counts ending, we are
 - Tracking data on child care program closure, complaints, and changes in child care capacity
 - Working with the UW-Madison Institute for Research on Poverty on a survey of all providers in their final Child Care Counts funding application
