



Safety Revisions Elevated - 2021



Why were the changes necessary?

Racial disparities occur at nearly every major decision-making point along the child welfare continuum.



Why were the changes necessary?

Stakeholders identified the need for revisions to Wisconsin's current danger threat language and safety assessment process.

Project Scope

Enhance the current safety model (existing SAFE framework), to better facilitate a process to create comprehensive safety plans with and informed by families that better identify and document danger threats AND protective capacities.

Changes Implemented: June, 2022



Identified problematic, biased language and where changes could be made



Did not change intent of threat




Removed language in the danger threats that contain buzzwords and subjective wording.




Ground the danger threat in the parent's/caregiver's behavior and the effect on the child.




...Facilitates upfront safety decisions informed by families



...Direct connection to the case process



Safety Revisions II: Spring 2022 - Present

How do we make safety assessing and planning more digestible, usable, result in safe kids



Identify kids at imminent risk of harm



Engage families earlier in the process



Keep more kids in home with plans



Fixing language so that it is equitable, just and wards against bias





Desired Outcome

Development of a process and criteria by which to identify children who are unsafe and require CPS intervention that focuses on maintaining children safely in their home, accomplished by engaging parents/caregivers in the assessment, decision making and planning process.

Building off workgroup and stakeholder feedback

Partnering with PDS



Scope is broader:

Will include additional changes to danger threat language



May include: Combining or eliminating threats

Having one list of Danger Threats

Changes to Safety Definitions and Threshold Criteria



Will not include:

Eliminating the safety model completely


