

Chapter 56 RevisionsFoster Care Licensing Rule




- Reduces administrative burden on relative and like-kin caregivers and the workforce.
- O Decreases timeframe for caregiver licensure and payments.
- Provides pay equity.
 - Creates separate licensing pathway for relative and like-kin caregivers.

Access Response Time Pilot



Pilot goal: To make the response time decision point easier for the workforce and more consistent across the state.

- DMCPS and 10 local CPS agencies participating.
- No changes to screening decision.
- Simpler, more straightforward response time decision-making.
 - Six criteria to determine how quickly to respond.
 - Allows IA to gather information before identifying danger threats.
- Positive experiences and data so far!



Youth Justice Training WiLearn Youth Justice



Accessible, focused training that prepares the workforce to work with families in making decisions to support youth.

Foundational Elements include:

- "Culturally-Responsible Practice"
- "Trauma-Informed Practice"
- "Engaging Families"

- "Case Practice with American Indian Tribes"
- "Case Practice with American Indian Tribes: Understanding WICWA"

Youth Justice Training Youth Justice Philosophy and Case Process




Offers foundational knowledge for new YJ professionals that will set up the rest of the learner's training arc.

Becomes a prerequisite for new YJ professionals hired on or after January 1, 2026.

New YJ professionals will be auto-enrolled.

Ideal sequence:



Supporting Youth and Children (SYNC)





Secure and efficient exchange of information between child welfare agencies and group care providers.

2025 enhancements include:

- Access to up-to-date status of referrals.
- Provider updates section can now document/update:
 - Program description.
 - Operational capacity.
- Provider forms expansion.
- Automated messages.

Independent LivingIndependent Living Transition to Discharge Plan



February 2025 eWiSACWIS changes were made to make the discharge process more **meaningful** and **supportive**.

Sections designated with a * below have at least one field that is required for all ILTDs, regardless of whether the youth does or does not participate in their discharge planning. The sections designated with a ‡ have at least one field that is required when the youth actively participates in their discharge planning, in addition to those already required for all ILTDs.



A Guide for Youth in Out-of-Home Care Placements in Wisconsin

For youth ages 14 and older placed in court-ordered relative placements, foster homes, group homes, residential care centers, or Supervised Independent Living placements



Where we're going.

Placement with relatives and like-kin Keeping children with those who know and love them





- Placing more children with relatives and like-kin at initial placement when they cannot safely remain in their homes.
 - Making progress through efforts like DCF 56 revisions.

What can you do today?

- ✓ Find out what this number looks like in your community by using the Implementation Support Metrics Dashboard.
- ✓ Set goals and develop strategies for reaching them.
- ✓ Continue to assess progress and local change.

Limiting child support collections for OHC



Child support collection while a child is in out-of-home care **directly** and **negatively** impacts child and family outcomes.

Reduces family income.

Decreases family stability.

Increases time to reunification.

Limiting child support collections would mean:

- Financial resources stay with the family, supporting reunification and family stability.
- Over time, a reduction in out-of-home care costs for agencies.

What can you do today?

✓ Start or continue local discussions about ceasing collections or minimizing collections. What are concrete steps your agency can take?

Tailored Dispositional Orders Project



51 counties will have received the TDO CHIPS training by the end of 2025.

28 counties have participated in the youth justice training.

Keys to achieving better outcomes:



Work effectively with all partners and incorporate tailored recommendations into decision-making up front at Disposition.



Ensure Dispositional conditions/services are informed by the needs and strengths of the youth.



Divert low-risk youth and prioritize resources for youth with the greatest need.

→ Next step is the evaluation phase.

Motivational Interviewing





Motivational Interviewing (MI) Exploration and Implementation Workgroup launching in January.

The workgroup:

- Includes counties and lived experts.
- Will explore strategies for MI implementation (including ability to claim IV-E revenue).

Aims include:

- Improving family engagement and outcomes.
- Integrating MI into Wisconsin's prevention plan.
- Build statewide MI capacity.

What can you do today?

✓ Start or continue local discussions about how to build stronger and more meaningful engagement with families.

Partner with counties and the workforce and invest in solutions to support the workforce so they can engage with families and support families in their communities.




Work with our legal partners to ensure better outcomes for children, youth and families.
