



Jeanine B. Settlement Agreement Report of the Bureau of Milwaukee Child Welfare 2012

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Introduction

Background to Jeanine B. Settlement Agreement

This report provides information on the progress of the Bureau of Milwaukee Child Welfare (BMCW) in meeting the requirements of the Jeanine B. Settlement Agreement.

In 1993 the American Civil Liberties Union Children's Rights Project (now Children's Rights, Inc.) filed suit in the Federal District Court for the Eastern District of Wisconsin on behalf of an estimated class of 5,000 children who were receiving child welfare services in Milwaukee County. The Milwaukee County Executive, the Director of the Milwaukee County Human Services Division, the Governor and the Secretary of the Department of Health and Social Services¹ were named as defendants.

The complaint was a broad-based challenge to the administration of the Milwaukee County child welfare system, stating that it failed in its obligation to provide adequate child welfare services to children and families. The complaint alleged that the State failed to adequately supervise and fund the Milwaukee County system.

In response to the lawsuit and to improve the safety and well-being of children, the state of Wisconsin assumed direct responsibility for administering and funding Milwaukee County child welfare effective January 1, 1998. The lawsuit subsequently continued only against the state defendants. In 2002, the parties reached a settlement of the litigation. The Settlement Agreement requires BMCW to achieve specific outcomes regarding the permanency, safety and well-being of Milwaukee County children in out-of-home care. Only one of the numerous outcomes required in the Settlement Agreement has not yet been accomplished.

Format of Report

This is the second semi-annual report for 2012. It includes outcomes of BMCW's performance from July 1 through December 31, 2012, and reports data from January 1 through December 31, 2012.

This report is divided into three sections. The first section describes the performance towards the **remaining enforceable provision**. The second section includes the status of **provisions that are no longer subject to enforcement**. These provisions are no longer enforced because BMCW was in compliance with the provisions for two consecutive six-month periods as stipulated in the terms of the Settlement Agreement. The third section includes the status of **non-enforceable process indicators and outcomes** inclusive of safety, well-being and permanency objectives included in the Settlement Agreement. This information was identified in previous reports as "monitoring items." Provisions that are no longer operative are excluded from this report. For example, Section I.B.5 of the Settlement Agreement is inoperative because the Subsidized Guardianship waiver was not obtained before January 1, 2003; thus the controlling requirement is I.B.4.

During 2012, Section I.B.6 moved from an enforceable provision to a provision no longer subject to enforcement. BMCW met the required performance standard for the two consecutive six month periods of July – December 2011 and January – June 2012. By agreement of the parties, Section I.B.6 was released from enforcement as of July 1, 2012. Section I.B.6 performance for 2012 therefore is included in the second section of this annual report, provisions no longer subject to enforcement.

¹ The Department was subsequently renamed the Department of Health and Family Services. Beginning in July 2008, responsibility for BMCW was transferred to the newly created Department of Children and Families.

Data

Most of the data presented in this report were generated from the electronic Wisconsin Statewide Automated Child Welfare Information System (eWiSACWIS). To create a more streamlined document for the reader, the rounding of performance percentages (past and present) occurs in most instances.

Annual Performance of Remaining Enforceable Provision, CY 2003 – CY 2012

§I.D.9 As of July 1, 2012, at least the following percentages of children in BMCW custody within the period shall have had three or fewer placements during the previous 36 calendar months of their current episode in BMCW custody. The number of placements will exclude time-limited respite care placements and returns to the same caregiver after an intervening placement during the same out of care episode. Those children in BMCW custody through the Wraparound Milwaukee program shall be excluded from this calculation. Initial assessment center placements also will be excluded from the calculation.

Note: The formula for this performance standard was modified effective July 1, 2012 pursuant to agreement among the parties and Court approval.² The original formula was in effect for the first six months covered by this report. The data in the second six months covered by this report was calculated using the modified formula.

² Modified I.D.9. Measure – At least the following percentages of children in BMCW custody within the period shall have had three or fewer placements during the previous 36 calendar months of their current episode in BMCW custody. The number of placements will exclude time-limited respite care placements and returns to the same caregiver after an intervening placement during the same out of care episode. Those children in BMCW custody through the Wraparound Milwaukee program shall be excluded from this calculation. Initial assessment center placements also will be excluded from the calculation (Specified percentages remain the same).

Section I. Remaining Enforceable Provision

Placement Stability

Placement Stability, January – June 2012

I.D.9. At least the following percentages of children in BMCW custody within the period shall have had three or fewer placements after January 1, 1999, during their current episode in BMCW custody. The number of placements will exclude time-limited respite care placements and returns to the same caregiver after an intervening placement during the same out of care episode. Those children in BMCW custody through the Wraparound Milwaukee program shall be excluded from this calculation.

Placement Stability, July – December 2012

I.D.9. At least the following percentages of children in BMCW custody within the period shall have had three or fewer placements during the previous 36 calendar months of their current episode in BMCW custody. The number of placements will exclude time-limited respite care placements and returns to the same caregiver after an intervening placement during the same out of care episode. Those children in BMCW custody through the Wraparound Milwaukee program shall be excluded from this calculation. Initial assessment center placements also will be excluded from the calculation.

BMCW did not meet the performance standard for 2012.

A. 2012 annual placement stability performance is 84 percent whereas the standard is 90 percent.

Although below the standard of 90 percent, performance during the second six-month period of CY 2012 (86 percent) reached the highest level of any six-month period since the start of the Settlement Agreement. Performance in CY 2012 followed the trend of steady improvement since CY 2005. The data in Table 1.1 show historical performance since 2003.

B. 2012 annual performance for the partner agencies was 81 percent and 86 percent and BMCW Initial Assessment was 99 percent.

The data in Table 1.2 show the monthly and annual performance by each agency for 2012.

- CHW-CS (Children's Hospital of WI – Community Services) achieved an annual performance rate of 81 percent.
- IFS (Integrated Family Services) achieved an annual performance rate of 86 percent.
- BMCW Initial Assessment achieved an annual performance rate of 99 percent.

Numbers Behind the Provisions No Longer Subject to Enforcement (January to December 2012)

§I.B.2 Of the 572 children reaching 15 of the last 22 months in out-of-home care, 499 (87 percent) children had a Termination of Parental Rights (TPR) petition filed or an allowable ASFA exception documented.
§I.B.3 Of the 32 children in BMCW custody for more than 15 of the last 22 months in out-of-home care without a TPR petition previously filed or an allowable exception indicated, 32 children (100 percent) belatedly had a TPR petition filed or an allowable exception documented.
§I.B.4 On average each month, 680 (12 percent) children in BMCW out-of-home care were in care for 24 or more months (measured against the baseline of 5,533 children).
§I.B.6 Of the 608 children reunified with parents or caretakers, 398 (65 percent) were reunified within 12 months of entry into out-of-home care. ⁴
§I.B.7 Of the 236 children with a finalized adoption, 80 (34 percent) of the finalizations occurred within 24 months of the child's entry into care.
§I.C.1 Of the 2,980 children in an out-of-home care placement, 7 children (0.23 percent) were the victims of Child Abuse or Neglect by a foster parent (two children), treatment foster parent (one child), staff of a facility required to be licensed (two children), or court ordered kinship provider (two children).
§I.C.2 Of the 144 reports referred to the independent investigation agency, 142 (99 percent) were referred within three business days.
§I.C.3 Of the 144 reports referred for independent investigation, 144 (100 percent) were assigned to an independent investigator within three business days of the referral from BMCW.
§I.C.4 Of the 132 investigations completed by the independent investigative agency, 130 (98 percent) of the determinations were completed within 60 days of receipt of the referral.
§I.D.3 Of the 24,970 (cumulative total) expected monthly face-to-face contacts, 24,352 (98 percent) were achieved.

Numbers Behind the Process Indicators (January to December 2012)
Of the 473 required family assessments, 431 (91 percent) were completed within 90 days.
Of the 810 expected initial health screens, 711 (88 percent) were completed within five business days.
Of the 100 children in the sample who changed placements or experienced their first placement, 77 providers (77 percent) received and signed for a copy of the Information for Foster Parent's Face Sheet and Checklist.
On average each month, 1,993 of 2,130 children (94 percent) were current with their annual medical exams.
On average each month, 1,465 of 1,694 children (86 percent) were current with their annual dental exams.
Of the 824 Initial Permanency Plans, 658 (80 percent) were completed within 60 days.
Of the 3,104 annual and administrative permanency plan reviews, 2,900 (93 percent) were conducted timely.
Of the 1,007 children who entered out-of-home care, 92 children (9 percent) entered care within 12 months of a prior out-of-home care episode.
At the start of 2012, there were 151 Ongoing Case Managers. During the year, 71 Ongoing Case Managers separated from their position and 128 were hired.
On average each month, 178 Ongoing Case Managers worked with an average of 2,524 children.
