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Historical Information

- The project began in January 2022 with the support of Casey Family Programs to reduce Milwaukee's usage of Congregate Care
- In line with Family First Prevention Services Act (FFPSA) to serve more youth in family-based settings and in their homes whenever possible
- The project set the ambitious goal of reducing DMCPS Congregate
 Care usage by 40% by the end of 2024



Why was this so important?


Priority: Moving youth from group care to family-like settings

- Research is clear that outcomes improve when youth are placed in family-like settings
 - Less time in out-of-home care and fewer placements
 - More likely to be placed with siblings
 - More likely to be placed in community of origin
- Trauma reduction for youth





Percentage of Group Care Reduction






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

Strategies Implemented

Disruptive Leadership

Design Team (met 2x/month)

Implementation Teams

- Youth with L1/2 CANS Scores in GHs
- Kin-Forward Culture
- Prevention of Step-Up Placements
- TFC Provider Engagement
- Supporting young people as they transition to lower levels of care

Lessons Learned

- This work is HARD
- Once youth are in group care, it's really hard to move them to lower levels
- Sibling groups are difficult
- When additional attention is on group care placements, it has improved over time



Changes to Practice

- Weekly/Monthly staffings at the agencies regarding youth in group care
- Additional <u>oversight</u> of placements in group care
 - Management-level discussions and plans
- Different thought-work
- Expansion of placement team and relative searches



What's the Future?

- Continuing to focus on group home and residential care center placements by:
 - Focusing on placement moves to and from group care
 - Continuing lessons learned
 - Collaborative staffings
 - Addition of measurement to case management contract focusing on group care
 - In-home placements, like-kin placements and identification of alternative placement resources for higher level of needs youth
 - Family Finding Pilot
