Background and Purpose



This report expands on information historically included in the Settlement Agreement and includes information about:

- Safety
- Permanency
- Well-being
- Workforce



Access: Volume of Child Protective Service (CPS) Reports January through December (2020 through 2024)






Five-Year Trend of CPS Reports by Year (2020-2024):

- A total of **15,076** CPS
 Reports were received from
 January through December
 2024
- There were 109 more (<1% increase) CPS Reports received in 2024 than in 2023

Access: Volume and Response Time of Child Protective Service (CPS) Reports





CPS Reports by Month (January-December 2024):

- On average, **1,256** CPS reports received per month
- On average, **486** (**39%**) CPS Reports screened-in
- A total of **5,834** CPS reports were screened-in **(8% decrease** from 2023)


Response Times (average):

- **16**% Same Day
- 65% within five business days

Reporters:

 73% of reports were received from mandated reporters

Initial Assessments and Independent Investigations






Initial Assessments (IA) and Independent Investigations (January-December 2024)

- 5,594 IAs completed
- 92 Independent Investigations completed
- An average of 74 DMCPS staff completed an average of 466 Initial Assessments per month
- An average of three
 Professional Services Group /
 Community Impact Programs
 (PSG/CIP) staff completed an
 average of eight Independent
 Investigations each month

Timeliness of Completing Initial Assessments (IA) and Independent Investigations (January-December 2024):


 4,206 (74%) of 5,686 of the Initial Assessments and Independent Investigations were completed within 60 days

Initial Assessment Staffing:

- At the beginning of 2024, there were 77 initial assessment specialists (IAS)
- 29 IAS were hired, and 17 IAS separated employment resulting in a turnover rate of 16% for calendar year 2024

Safety: Re-Entry, Face-to-Face Contacts, and Maltreatment





Re-Entry (January-December 2024):

 39 children re-entered out-of-home care within 12 months when their prior discharge was reunification or guardianship

Face-to-Face Contacts (January-December 2024):

• 97% of the 20,005 expected visits occurred


Maltreatment by Provider to Child(ren) in OHC (January-December 2024)

- Five children were abused while in OHC:
 - 5 y/o Physical Abuse (Treatment Foster Home-NR)
 - 2 y/o Physical Abuse (General Foster Home-NR)
 - 6 y/o Sexual Abuse (Kinship)
 - 6 y/o Sexual Abuse (Kinship)
 - 4 y/o Neglect (General Foster Home-Relative)

NR is Non-Relative


Safety: Maltreatment over Time

Permanency: Entries into Out-of-Home Care






Entries in Out-of-Home Care (January-December 2024):

- At the beginning of 2024, there were **1,721** children in OHC
- On average per month, 65 children entered OHC, and 64 children exited OHC
- At the end of 2024, there were 1,708 children in OHC

Permanency: Placement Groups





Placement Types (January-December 2024):

- On average, **86**% of children were placed in a family-like settings
- On average, 9% of children were placed in congregate care
- On average, 5% of children were in other settings


Relative Placements: (January-December 2024):

 On average, 39% of children were placed with relatives

Youth 12 years and older (January-December 2024):

- On average, **515** children
- Of these children, **53**% were placed in a family setting

Children in OHC in the last ten years






Children in Out-of-home care (2015-2024)

- At the end of 2015, there were 2276 children in OHC
- At the end of 2024; there were 1708 children in OHC
- (25% decrease)

Permanency: Foster Homes in the last ten years






Foster Homes (2015-2024):

- At the beginning of 2015, there were 649 foster homes
- From 2015 through 2017 there was a net gain of foster homes
- In the last four years there were net losses of at least 25 licensed homes per year

Permanency: Foster Homes






Foster Homes (January-December 2024)

- 470 foster homes (annual average)
- 191 providers newly licensed
- 216 providers licenses were closed

Permanency: Length of Stay in Out-of-Home Care






Length of Stay (January-December 2024):

- 1,743 is the annual average number of children in out-of-home care (OHC)
- 620 (36%) is the annual average number of children in OHC greater than 24 months.

Permanency: Discharge Reasons






Discharge Reasons (January-December 2024):

- 762 children discharged from Out-of-home Care
 - 335 to reunification
 - 157 to guardianship
 - 189 to adoption
 - 81 to other

Timeliness to Permanency (January-December 2024):

- 141 of 335 (42%) reunified within 12 months
- 66 of 157 (42%) had a guardianship within 24 months
- 60 of 189 (32%) children were adopted within 24 months

Well-being: Annual Medical and Dental Exams





Medical (January-December 2024):


 On average per month, 1,605 of 1,751 children (92%) were current and documented their annual medical exams

Dental (January-December 2024):

 On average per month, 1,159 of 1,443 children (80%) were current and documented their annual dental exams

Workforce: Child Welfare Case Manager Staffing and Caseload





Child Welfare Case Manager Staffing (January-December 2024):

- At the beginning of 2024, there were **164** child welfare case managers
- 53 staff were hired
- **55** staff separated employment
- At the end of 2024, there were 162 child welfare case managers
- 25% staff turnover rate

Caseloads for Child Welfare Case Managers (January-December 2024):

On a yearly average, 64 of 154
 (41%) case carrying child welfare case managers (CWCM) had more than 15 children on their caseload

Summary of Performance – Key Takeaways

- The volume of CPS Reports appears to have stabilized from the pandemic. The screen-in rate for 2024 was 39%. This continues the downward trend and is the lowest rate reported dating back to 2007 (consistent with the statewide trend)
- Significant improvements were made in the timeliness of completing Initial Assessments this measure improved from 60% in 2023 to 74% in 2024
- Thirty-nine children re-entered OHC within 12 months (15 less than 2023)
- Five children were victims of maltreatment by their provider while in OHC
- The total number of children in OHC continues to decrease (1,708 children at the end of 2024)
- The number of foster homes is also decreasing, and at a higher rate than the number of children in OHC
- Medical and dental performance continues to improve
- Staffing of initial assessment specialists (IAS) and child welfare case managers (CWCMs) improved significantly
