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## Foster Youth Graduation event celebrates academic success

(Madison) — A special group of foster youths was honored this week at a unique graduation party hosted by the Wisconsin Department of Children and Families (DCF). First Lady Tonette Walker and DCF Secretary Eloise Anderson presided over the celebration, which was held at the Executive Residence, recognizing former foster youth who recently graduated from high school or completed milestones in post-secondary education.

"I'm honored to be a part of celebrating the accomplishments of these young graduates," said First Lady Tonette Walker. "These young men and women have shown great determination in overcoming many obstacles that foster youth face. It's wonderful to see that they have made an important investment, through education, to create positive opportunities for their future. They are role models for all foster youth."

Thirty-eight graduates from across Wisconsin were recognized during the ceremony, representing the one-hundred and twenty-two foster youth who were reported as having reached

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commencement this year. While most of the students at the ceremony were celebrating their graduation from high school, two students celebrated completion of their Bachelor's Degrees.

Youth in foster care often face significant obstacles in achieving academic success. Nationally, only about 54% of foster youth will graduate from high school; only 2% will go onto college. Most suffer not only the loss of their biological family, but have had to face multiple foster home moves, changes in case workers and being uprooted from friends and schools. On average, foster kids will move six times between kindergarten and 12th grade.

"These students deserve to be recognized for their academic achievement," said Eloise Anderson. "They are shining examples that despite whatever hardships a person might face, you can still achieve your goals through hard work, determination and perseverance."

Former foster youth Greta Munns of Eau Claire also spoke, and inspired the graduates about their future. Munns serves as UW-Stout's first Foster Care Liaison.

Some of the youth at yesterday's event were currently in foster care. Through the new 2013 Wisconsin Act 334, out-of-home care may be extended to 21 years of age for youths with individual education program plans.
