Six adoptive families received awards:

Rebecca and Robert Brooks of Manitowoc are advocates for the adoption of teenagers and older youth who need a forever home. They have adopted nine children and excel at working with children striving to overcome challenges.

Jena and Scott Holman of Clintonville were recognized for not only adopting five children, but for having specialized skills working with children who have medical and other special needs. The Holmans advocate for children and help others through respite care.

Sara and Jason McEvilly of Milwaukee were honored for compassion to keep a sibling group together. Through the help of their extended family, their adopted son is able to continue to build a strong bond with his brother and sister. The McEvillys also are passionate about raising awareness of the need for more forever homes.

Joe and Angela Quance of Wausau have adopted one child, but continue to foster children in hopes of expanding their family once again. They understand trauma and help children heal through the safe and positive relationships they build. The Quances also reach out across cultures to ensure children remain connected.

Annemarie and Bill Scobey-Polacheck of Glendale were recognized for not only adopting two girls, but for their dedication to learning and providing trauma-informed care. They have also been very pro-active in understanding cultural and transracial interactions and reach out within the community to raise cultural awareness.

Erica Reyes of Eau Claire is a single mother of five adopted children and also cares for her ill father. She is an advocate for trauma-informed care and has a passion for helping children who sometimes need extra special care.

Although many Wisconsin families have made the commitment to adopt children, the event highlighted the need for more families to step forward to create these unique and special families through adoption.
