Discussion of the present revisions:

LANGUAGE

The group collectively discussed language consistency throughout.

- Abusive and non-abusive parent
 - However, in some instances such as statutes, the language will have to match the statute
 - When discussing general dynamics, "victim" may be more accurate than "non-abusive parent"
 - o Is it better to use "victim" due to its statutory meaning?
 - Discussion tabled for meeting on Introduction and Definitions sections
- For gender neutral: singular "they"
 - o Again, for statute, language must match
- Tegan: Families use different vocabulary for themselves how do we represent this?
- **Kelsey:** We can bracket the language and instruct GALs to follow the lead of families, e.g., [parent]
- Amber, Kelsey, Tegan: Not all survivors are in a relationship with the person who has been abusive, how do we represent this? Again, instead of partner [other parent]
- Amber: Domestic abuse (not domestic violence)
- Kari: Can we use GAL instead of guardian ad litem? Group agrees.

STEP ONE

- Steps in an Investigation
- Interviewing Children
- **Tegan:** Disclaimer about seeking additional resources before interviewing children, including the Appendices.
 - Kelsey: A child interviewing expert has agreed to review.
 - Amber: Would someone within DCF have additional resources to add? Possibly add links.
- Restraining Orders Amber/Gricel: Due to attorney audience, this section can be shortened.
 Make the formatting consistent across the four types of restraining order. Reference that they are a tool that can support safety within a family case

STEP TWO

- Coercive control
 - o **Krystal:** Tie this back, creating questions a GAL should ask themselves to reflect.
- Developmental stages.
 - Amber: Make this into a table, provide key info. Kelsey: Include the developmental goals for each stage.
- Parenting in the context of domestic abuse
 - Bronson/Gricel: Need to include something on how the non-abusive parent is affected, often this is a sticking point in custody/placement decisions.

- **Krystal:** There is some research showing the resolution of parenting deficits caused by trauma when an abusive relationship has ended.
- Amber: Move "trauma signs" practice point into this new subsection.

STEP THREE

- Statutory presumptions
 - Kari: Make the emphasis on the fact that the presumption must be addressed prior to the best interest of the children factors.
- Best interest factors
 - Parental alienation: Discussion of who has expertise to provide information. Kelsey to reach out to experts for resources.

STEP FOUR

- Group approved changes to formatting of the section titles
- Group approved change to format language for recommendations as a table

Next steps:

- Wrap up revision of Step 4
- Discuss Introduction and Definitions and Foundation sections
- Finalize language for consistency throughout (e.g., victim or non-abusive parent, abuser or abusive parent, domestic violence or domestic abuse)
