- · Health and wellness
- · Family well-being
- · Family engagement
- · Prenatal services
- · Home visiting

Who is eligible for Head Start?


Eligible children and families may include:

- Children and families with incomes below the poverty guidelines
- · Children in foster care regardless of income
- · Children with special needs
- · Homeless children
- Children from families receiving public assistance, such as:
 - Temporary Assistance for Needy Families
 - Supplemental Social Security
 - SNAP (Wisconsin FoodShare)

How can you apply for Head Start and Early Head Start?

To apply for Head Start and early Head Start, contact the program serving your community. Your local program will provide you with the required forms and answer your questions. They will also tell you what documents you should bring with you to apply.
