Bills of Interest Introduced so far this Session

Bill #	Summary	Status
AB-123/SB-131	Child relocation (calculation of miles for purposes of relocation of a child 100 miles or more from the other parent in an action affecting the family)	Introduced in both houses
AB-111/SB-106	Psychiatric residential treatment facilities (PRTFs) Providing an exemption from emergency rule procedures for psychiatric and residential treatment facilities	Introduced in both houses
AB-112/SB-107	Consent to mental health treatment by minors who are age 14 or older Bill allows either a minor age 14 or older, or the minor's parent or guardian to consent to begin outpatient or inpatient mental health treatment of the minor	Introduced in both houses
AB-113/SB-108	Sharing minors' safety plans Requires DHS to develop and maintain a portal for sharing safety plans for minors in crisis	Introduced in both houses
AB-114/SB-109	Clinician initiation of emergency detention of a minor, granting rule-making authority and providing a penalty Allows counties to elect to authorize certain medical and behavioral health clinicians to initiate emergency detentions of minors	Introduced in both houses
AB-115/SB-110	Authorizing youth behavioral health program under the Medical Assistance program and granting rule-making authority	Introduced in both houses
AB-116/SB-111	Transportation of minors for emergency detention Bill provides for acceptable forms of transportation and reimbursement process	Introduced in both houses
AB-70/SB-79	A disclaimer of parental rights and payments allowed in connection with an adoption A parent may disclaim parental rights by affidavit in connection with an adoption	Introduced in both houses
AB-79/SB-73	Prosecuting or adjudicating delinquent person under the age of 18 for committing an act of prostitution Safe Harbor – Under this bill, a person who is under the age of 18 may not be prosecuted or adjudicated delinquent for committing an act of prostitution	Introduced in both houses
AB-20/SB-20	Earned income tax credit Allows a married claimant to file a separate return if the claimant lives apart from their spouse and is unable to file a joint return due to domestic abuse	Introduced in both houses

SB-23/AB-97	<i>Extension of eligibility under the Medical Assistance program for postpartum women</i> <i>Expands eligibility for services from 60 days to up to one year for women post partum</i>	Introduced in both houses
AB-49/SB-70	<i>A minor's authority to consent to health care</i> <i>Allows a minor who is an unaccompanied youth to consent to, contract for, and receive medically necessary care without a parent or guardian's permission under certain circumstances</i>	Introduced in both houses
