Intentional Program Violation (IPV)  
1st Violation

You were found to have committed your 1st intentional program violation (IPV). An IPV means that you have not followed the rules of the Wisconsin Works (W-2) program on purpose.

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Date(s) of violation	W-2 Rule Violation
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You will be denied W-2 eligibility for 6 months since this is your 1st violation. You will be denied W-2 services and payments from [mm/dd/yyyy] to [mm/dd/yyyy]. You will receive a separate Notice of Eligibility informing you of your denial.

You have until [mm/dd/yyyy] to provide additional information to your worker about why you did not follow the W-2 program rules. Your W-2 agency will decide whether this additional information will change the IPV decision.

If you commit a 2nd IPV, you may be denied W-2 for 12 months. If you commit a 3rd IPV, you may be permanently denied W-2, which means that you can no longer receive W-2 services or payment.

If you have questions, contact your W-2 worker listed above.

If you think you might have any medical, emotional, or learning needs that may be preventing you from participating in the W-2 program, tell your W-2 worker right away. You may also want to tell your W-2 worker about any domestic violence you experienced. You may ask your W-2 worker to help complete the Barrier Screening Tool. You may ask your W-2 worker to refer you to a formal assessment with a doctor or other qualified professional. The Barrier Screening Tool and formal assessments will give your W-2 worker more information about your needs. The information you get can help you and your W-2 worker make informed decisions about your W-2 placement, your employment goals and the activities that will help you reach those goals, your ability to engage in training and education prior to employment and any special services or work site accommodations that you may need.
