

Getting Started

- Review Administration of Scale starting on page 9
 - 3-hour observation
 - No staff interview
- Review new terms used throughout the scale starting on page 12
 - Accessible
 - Engaged
 - Play area vs Interest center
- Print off Additional Notes for Clarification for the FCCERS-3 (once available)
- Focus on one subscale at a time
 - Read through each indicator for items in the subscale you are working on
 - Review both the notes for clarification and the additional notes for clarification
 - Review and answer the following questions for the subscale you are working on
- Complete a rating on the individual subscale
 - Identify strengths
 - Create a plan of action – identifying areas for improvement
 - Implement plan of action
- Follow the same process for the next subscale

Questions to Consider for Increasing Quality

Space and Furnishings

- Is the provider able to control the lighting and ventilation?
- Do children have access to a substantial amount of softness?
- What are the defined play areas or interest centers in the program?
- How often does the provider talk with children about the displayed items?

Personal Care Routines

- List meal and snack times, is there 3-hours or less between meals?
- What are the proper handwashing procedures and when should hands be washed?
- How does the provider encourage children to manage health practices independently?
- Define major and minor hazard. Make a list of major and minor hazards. What can the provider do to decrease major and minor hazards in your program?

Language and Books

- Does the provider talk with children in a playful way? How often do they engage in this practice?
- Does the provider use specific names for people, places, things, and actions?

Helping Providers Prepare for FCCERS-3

- How does the provider respond to children's attempts to communicate?
- How often does the provider read with children?
- Does the provider encourage children to use books independently?

Activities

- During a 3-hour time period, how much time do children have access to learning materials?
- What materials are accessible during a 3-hour time period?
- Does the provider visit all play areas and interest centers while children are engaged in free play?
- How often does the provider engage in conversations with children who are engaged in free play?
- What are some examples of ways the provider can extend children's interest in each of the activities areas?
- During a 3-hour time sample, how much time do children have access to a gross motor space?
- What types of gross motor equipment do children have access to?

Interaction

- What is vigorous gross motor play? How often are children engaged in vigorous gross motor play?
- Is the provider actively involved with children during gross motor play?

- Does the provider circulate through the space and engage with small groups or individual children during free play?
- A visitor would describe provider-child interactions in the program as; positive, neutral, or negative?
- Does the provider facilitate positive peer interactions? How do they handle negative interactions?
- Make a list of expectations, are these expectations appropriate for the age of children enrolled?

Program Structure

- Look at the posted schedule, how many transitions do children experience daily? Can some of these transitions be combined or eliminated?
- What do children do while they are waiting for the next activity?
- During a 3-hour time sample, how long are children engaged in free play?
- Look at the posted schedule, how many whole-group activities are there each day? How long do these whole-group activities last?
